

What are fit factors?

How do you begin your search?

Fit factors: big/small school, class size, location, distance from home, urban/suburban/rural, type of institution, academic programs, class size, student body organizations, student-to-teacher-ratio, etc.

Academic Offerings: majors/minors, degrees, etc.

Cost of Attendance: Tuition (In-state or Out-of State), Books + Supplies, Room & Board, Transportation, Health Insurance, Personal

Compatibility is key

Categorize your schools

First, *separate* based on the type of institution

- -UC, CSU, Private, Out of States
- -(optional) label into Research, Liberal Arts, Religiously Affiliated, etc.

Second, *research* the Admission Rate, the required Average GPA, Average Test Scores (optional), and Percent Need Met -Ex: Pomona College (Liberal Arts, Private); Admission Rate: 8%;GPA: 4.05; Need-met: 100%

Lastly, *label* the school <u>SAFETY</u>, <u>TARGET</u>, or <u>REACH</u>

* You can compensate for a lower GPA with more difficult classes, like AP or IB classes.

BALANCED COLLEGE LIST

<u>SAFETY SCHOOLS</u>- sometimes called a "backup school". You will mostly likely get in because your standardized test scores, class rank and high school grades are <u>well above the average</u> for admitted students and have relatively high acceptance rates.

TARGET SCHOOLS - School where your academic credentials (grades, SAT or ACT scores, and class rank) fall well within the school's average range for the most recently accepted class. There are no guarantees, but it's not unreasonable to expect to be accepted to several of your target schools.

REACH SCHOOLS - A particular college where your high school GPA and standardized test scores are below those of the college's average student.

The admission rate can alter whether this is a safety/target/reach school for you.

[Scenario] I have an average GPA of a 4.0. My school of interest is Stanford.

Stanford

Type of institution: Research, Private

Admission Rate: 4.4%

GPA: 3.96

Need met: 100%

Because the admission rate for stanford is 4.4%, it would make this school a reach school.

WHY? Chances of me getting in are pretty low based on how many students are actually admitted and its competitiveness as many students apply


REMEMBER: EVEN IF THE SCHOOL YOU WANT TO GO TO FALLS UNDER REACH, IT DOES NOT MEAN YOU CAN'T GET IN!



REMEMBER:

THIS IS JUST AN OVERVIEW OF SCHOOLS. MOST SCHOOLS HAVE A HOLISTIC APPLICATION REVIEW, SO THEY DON'T JUST LOOK AT YOUR GPA OR TEST SCORES.

(Essays are super important!)

WHAT ARE COLLEGE ADMISSIONS OFFICERS LOOKING FOR?

Who Am I?"

"Why Am I Here?"

"What is Unique About Me?"

"What Matters to Me? Why does it matter"

- 1. Who is this person?
- 2. Will this person contribute something of value to our campus?
- 3. Can this person write?

How Do I Write the Common App Essays?

It's encouraged for students to have their own voice and personality shine through. Personal Statements need to showcase you above all things.

A strong personal statement will have a theme that answers these *two* questions:

- 1) What happened?
- 2) Why does it matter?

The WHY (the learning or insight) is more important than the WHAT (the experience) (what you felt during that experience).

HOW DO I WRITE A GREAT COMMON APP ESSAY?





- 1. Brainstorm & think about how you want to answer the prompt
- 2. Structure your essay according to your topic (the question)
- 3. Write a draft.
- 4. Revise (Have several people proofread your essay)
- 5. Repeat.

Additional Tips for Writing the Essay

- Balance you vs. them (you should showcase you above all things)
- Admission officers want to know about your personal growth
- Brand yourself
 (focus on yourself)

COMMON APP

- Accepted by nearly 900 private colleges and some public but not California
- Through the platform, applicants can apply to multiple colleges at once.
- Each college may require additional information such as supplemental essays.

Personal Insight Question (PIQ) Summary and Tips:

The UC application essay is a way to give colleges a sense of your personality, your perspective and explain some experiences that made you into who you are today.

Essay tips:

- Think about what question is asking
- What is UC hoping to learn about you
- Find your arc (describe and explain the experience that has changed you but how you grew from it)
- Talk about personal growth
- Your personal statement needs to showcase you

UC Personal Insight Question (PIQ) Prompts

- 1. Describe an example of your leadership experience in which you have positively influenced others, helped resolve disputes, or contributed to group efforts over time.
- 2. Every person has a creative side, and it can be expressed in many ways: problem solving, original and innovative thinking, and artistically, to name a few. Describe how you express your creative side.
- 3. What would you say is your greatest talent or skill? How have you developed and demonstrated that talent over time?
- 4. Describe how you have taken advantage of a significant educational opportunity or worked to overcome an educational barrier you have faced.
- 5. Describe the most significant challenge you have faced and the steps you have taken to overcome this challenge. How has this challenge affected your academic achievement?
- 6. Think about an academic subject that inspires you. Describe how you have furthered this interest inside and/or outside of the classroom.
- 7. What have you done to make your school or your community a better place?
- 8. Beyond what has already been shared in your application, what do you believe makes you stand out as a strong candidate for admissions to the University of California?

Financial Aid

4 Types of Financial Aid

- → **Grants:** Need-based money with no repayment
- → Scholarships: Merit-/Performance-based without repayment
- → Work Study: Need-based campus job, wages go directly to student
- → Federal Loans: Fixed low-interest rate money that needs to be repaid

DEMONSTRATED INTEREST

 Demonstrated Interest refers to a student's ability to demonstrate interest in a particular college.

Do your research! The benefit to understanding the school will help you understand your college fit and help you demonstrate interest.

TEST OPTIONAL

→ Some schools have made the SAT/ACT **optional**, in other words it is not required for you to submit. Choosing to not submit your scores will not affect the way your application is reviewed and the case is the same if you do decide to submit your scores. IT IS IMPORTANT TO RESEARCH THE SCHOOLS AND STAY UP TO DATE!

EXTRACURRICULARS

- → Participate in activities you are truly interested in. Admissions staff can tell when a student's activities are inauthentic and solely a means of "resume building."
- → Commitment, Leadership, Involvement

THINGS TO DO: JUNIORS

- □ START THINKING ABOUT COLLEGES YOU'RE INTERESTED IN
 - → Think about which would be your reach, target and safety schools
 - → Make note of application deadlines as well as requirements (GPA, Essays, Letters of Recommendation, etc)
- START DRAFTING PERSONAL STATEMENTS/ PIQ RESPONSES
- ASK TEACHERS FOR LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION
 - → Someone who knows you well and would be able to write a strong letter for you
 - → Remember to write thank you letters for them too!
- LOOK INTO SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITIES
 - → Make note of deadlines and requirements (maybe put reminders in your calendar)
 - → Some are open to Juniors, many are for seniors which you will be in just a few short months


